Nova Southeastern University Law School did the essential work under the direction of J. Craig Garrett, the editor of the ILSA Journal. A third IPN containing papers selected from ILW 1997 is in preparation.

The Proceedings are thicker than usual this time (making up in a way for the thinness of the last Proceedings) as several ABILA Committees have recently completed their reports. Aside from Branch Committee Reports and other usual documents, the Proceedings for 1997-1998 will contain copies of the formal dinner and luncheon speeches given at International Law Weekend if the speakers make them available to us. By a quirk in our tradition, the available speeches for 1994 and 1995 appear in the 1995-96 Proceedings, and the speeches by the Hon. Edward McWhinney, Q.C., M.P., the Canadian Parliamentary Secretary (Fisheries and Oceans) and Judge Charles N. Brower, President of the American Society of International Law, both given at International Law Weekend 1996, will appear in the 1997-98 Proceedings along with the speeches given at International Law Weekend 1997, for the Hon. David R. Andrews, Legal Adviser to the Department of State, and by Judge Charles N. Brower, then President of the American Society of International Law.

Other Activities of the ABILA

The Executive Committee of the American Branch met on 3 April 1998. The major items were:

1. The election of a new Honorary Secretary:

Thanks were offered to Joel Trachtman for his four years of service in this position.

2. Professor John F. Murphy of Villanova Law School, a Vice President of the Branch, has accepted appointment as Chairman of the Nominating Committee for 1998. Invitations to join the Nominating Committee have been sent to three other members of the Executive Committee. Professor Rubin indicated that he would be willing reluctantly to continue as President for another two-year term, if the Nominating Committee so recommended, but would refuse renomination after that; in his opinion, it would be a

disservice to the organization for him to serve more than six years as President.

- 3. A proposal was made to encourage regional events sponsored by local law firms. Professor Cynthia Lichtenstein agreed to organize a pilot project along those lines.
- 4. It was decided to authorize the establishment of a webpage along the lines recommended by a Committee chaired by James P. Beggans, Esq. Those interested in the work of maintaining the page and updating its contents should contact Mr. Beggans directly:

International Law Association Biennial Conference

The 1998 biennial ILA meeting will take place in Taipei 24-30 May 1998. The Taiwan Branch will be host. By our Constitution, Branches of the Association are regional, and not necessarily national. Therefore, the Conference in Taiwan does not imply any position with regard to the future governance or territorial integrity of China.

The Registration Fee for ILA members registering after 31 March 1998 is US\$500; accompanying persons and full time students \$300. The registration fees for non-ILA members and their accompanying persons are \$700 and \$400 respectively. (It is cheaper to join the Branch and pay the members' fee than to register as a non-member.)

Other ILA News

The British Branch will be host for the jubilee year 2000. Planning has begun around the starting date of 13 August 2000.

The ILA is preparing a "Home Page" for the world wide web.

A proposal was made for the ILA to establish at the Taipei Conference a "study group" on state responsibility to parallel the work of the International Law Commission. The study group is not to be a Committee of the Association, but an aid to the ILC. Nominations are invited.

The ILA is seriously considering establishing a new publication to consist of short "think-pieces" that stimulate discussion of international legal issues. Apparently something along the line of our own International Practitioner's Notebook in its original incarnation is envisaged: "op. ed." pieces and letters to major newspapers would be circulated internationally. This publication would supplement the existing ILA Newsletter, which would continue to be circulated at no additional cost to all members. It would be called something like "International Law Forum de Droit International." The apparent redundancy would reflect the equality of English and French as the official languages of the ILA.

New Committee rules were recommended by the ILA Executive Council in London for Adoption in Taipei. They allow for more Committee members from the larger Branches of the Association. Under existing rules, only one Member and one Alternate Member are allowed from each Branch, although there are some historical remnants of a looser arrangement. Under the new rules, there would be one Member in any committee allowed from any Branch of the Association; two members from Branches with more than 150 members; and three members from Branches with more than 250 members. The American Branch normally has about 350 Members; thus we would be entitled to three Members in any ILA Committee. As soon as the new rules are adopted by the Full Council in Taiwan, all our Alternate Members in ILA Committees will be made full Members.

ILA Committees

There is yet another way to join an ILA Committee. Under the newly approved rules expected to be adopted formally at Taipei, Chairs of ILA Committees will be empowered to nominate up to three persons to membership in their Committees regardless of Branch affiliation. Each such nomination needs the approval of the Director of Studies. This procedure does not limit the existing authority of each Branch to nominate members to places in ILA committees subject to the approval of the chair of the committee, but provides the chairs with an additional source of expertise in case more than one, two or three members of any particular branch has expertise believed important to the work of the ILA committee. Nor does the new procedure limit the existing arrangement whereby chairs and reporters' positions can be filled by the Director of Studies without regard to Branch memberships.

Branch nominations: All ABILA memberships in the current ILA Committees are noted in the list attached to this Newsletter.

ILA Committee Membership Policy

Membership in international committees is based on individual reputation and achievement and does not represent any Branch orthodoxy. Nominations by the American Branch to international committees are normally reserved to members of the Branch who have achieved a reputation sufficient to support the nomination. Active work as Reporter or Chair of a Branch committee is frequently the most persuasive criterion to establish a reputation adequate to support nomination to an international committee.

Several international committees do not have American Branch members or alternates. The easiest way to be nominated to membership in an international committee is to serve as an organizer/chairman or reporter of an American Branch committee dealing with a related subject.

If there is no international committee currently dealing with a significant topic of sufficient interest, the easiest way to form one is to organize an American Branch committee on that topic, produce a report that can be circulated to our counterparts in the parent organization, and then propose an international committee. The successful proposer of an international committee is usually asked to be its organizer, chair or reporter. The process is not difficult.

There is constant turnover in membership of both American Branch and ILA committees. Those members of the Branch interested in participating more actively in the committee work of the organization at any level should contact the chairs of existing committees or the ABILA Director of Studies directly.
